The following are the minutes of the Board of Trustees of Passaic County Community College, One College Boulevard, Paterson, New Jersey, held on Tuesday, November 13, 2018.

CALL TO ORDER

President Rose stated that notice of the meeting was mailed to the Herald News, the Record, the Office of the County Clerk, and posted on the bulletin board of the College Boulevard building on November 30, 2017.

Chairman Nutter stated that inasmuch as adequate notice of the meeting had been given, the meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. A copy of the agenda was reviewed and available for public inspection.

PRESENTATION

The Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Hallmark Award

President Rose introduced Professor Jennifer Gasparino, Assistant Professor, Human Services and Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Advisor. Professor Gasparino then introduced Ms. Valeri Altouma, President of Alpha Eta Chi Chapter of PTK. Ms. Altouma explained the award process and how the College's chapter submitted their entry for the PCCC Board of Trustees to be considered for the *Board of Trustees Hallmark Award for Phi Theta Kappa*. She stated the reason for submitted the College's Board was due to the consistent enthusiasm the Board always displays toward PTK, encouraging the Chapter to reach new goals, as well as providing funding, support, motivation, and its dedication to helping the Chapter succeed,. Ms. Altouma, on behalf

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of PTK, presented Chairman Nutter with the *Phi Theta Kappa Hallmark Award* and Medallion, and informed the Board that each Trustee would also receive a medallion of its own.

President Rose stated that that award was presented at the Association of Community College Trustees' Annual Leadership Congress (ACCT) held in New York recently, with the PCCC Trustees board being the only board in the Northeast to receive the award; only four awards were given out in the country this year.

Student Government Association

President Rose gave an overview of the role of the Student Government Association (SGA), and stated that the groups get better each year, which he credits to the leadership provided by Ms. Maria Marte, Director of Student Activities. He stated in previous years it took up to six months for the students to know their roles as officers. With the guidance of Ms. Marte, who started a Leadership Development process to ensure there was a smooth transition from one board to the next, students are ready at the beginning of the year. President Rose also noted that the SGA continues to do great things for the student body.

SGA officers Mr. Casey Bucceri, President; Mr. Kelvin Azcati, Secretary; and Ms. Brenda Noriega, Treasurer, provided a brief statement of their personal goals, as well as their individual role in the SGA. They spoke about the mission of SGA being the voice of the student body between the faculty, staff, and administration, in addition to providing leadership training for students, promote student and faculty relationships, and holding various activities for students throughout the year. The Officers then discussed the many cultures the College has and how the SGA brings them all together. They continued speaking about the values of SGA, honesty, integrity, loyalty and respect which are in line with the values of the College.

In conclusion, the SGA Officers discussed three of its goals this year, with the first being to explore the history of SGA and its impact on students. Second, to build an alliance with the Boys and Girls Club to increase interest in STEM programs, and show what the College has to offer, which in turn could increase enrollment. And third, was to involve the Wanaque campus in order to increase activities there to demonstrate how each and every student of PCCC was important.

A brief question and answer session took place.

CONSIDERATION OF MINUTES – October 16, 2018

Chairman Nutter asked for a motion on Resolution #1 – Consideration of Minutes for October 16, 2018; moved by Trustee Moody; seconded by Trustee Marco. Upon roll call, Resolution #1 passed with Trustee Marco abstaining and all other members present voting "yes."

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ORGANIZATION OF THE BOARD

Election of Officers

Chairman Nutter relinquished the gavel to Secretary Rose. Secretary Rose announced that State Statute requires the Board of Trustees to organize during the eleventh month. He then asked for nominations for Chairperson of the Board of Trustees. Trustee Smith nominated Trustee Harvey J. Nutter as chairman of the board; Trustee DuHaime seconded the nomination. There being no other nominations, and upon voice vote, with all members present voting in favor approved the nomination to re-elect Trustee Harvey J. Nutter as Chairman of the PCCC Board of Trustees.

Chairman Nutter then asked for nominations for Vice Chair. Trustee Esquiche nominated Trustee Barbara Tanis; Trustee Smith seconded the nomination. There being no other nominations, and upon voice vote, with all members present voting in favor approved the nomination to re-elect Trustee Barbara Tanis as Vice-Chair of the PCCC Board of Trustees.

REPORTS

President:

President Rose gave an update on the *Community College Opportunity Grant* (CCOG) stating the College was one of the community colleges chosen to offer that grant. He explained the requirements, wherein a student's family income must be under \$45,000.00 a year to attend a community college for free. President Rose also stated the College was targeting students who started college but could not continue due to finances, and was in the process of reaching out to try to get those with some college but did not complete to come back. He stated many former students will hopefully take advantage of that grant and when a student earns a degree, they are more likely to get a better paying job, which would enable them to contribute to society. President Rose asked the Board and those in attendance that evening to spread the word throughout their communities about that grant.

A brief question and answer session on the requirements for eligibility, and if citizenship was needed took place. President Rose responded that the adjusted gross income must between \$0 and \$45,000.00 a year and if a person was eligible for DACA, then he/she would be eligible for the grant.

Trustee Moody asked what the amount for the Gear-Up grant was, with. President Rose responding it was \$750,000.00, explaining the Gear-Up program was a pre-college program that works with seventh grade students and follows them through their schooling until they reach

college. He emphasized that students who participate in that program have had a 100% graduation rate, as well as an attend college rate.

DISCUSSION AGENDA

The following items were approved for placement on the Action Items agenda:

A. Policy Matters

Annual Notice of Meetings

President Rose mentioned the December 18th Board of Trustees meeting would be held at the Passaic Academic Campus.

B. Business Items

Trustee Trivedi questioned the First quarter report, with President Rose stating the College has a projection of \$121,000.00 in surplus at this time, and looking ahead the next report could be substantially better.

Trustee Trivedi then asked if there would be more hiring. President Rose stated the College would only hire where and when it was needed. Trustee Trivedi questioned if the \$750,000.00 savings in benefits was due to health care. Mr. Steven Hardy, Vice President, Finance and Administrative Services, answered by stating a large amount was due to a lower than expected increase in health care premiums this January and not filling empty positions.

Trustee Ciambrone asked for clarification if the state pays for the free tuition. President Rose stated the state does pay the tuition in full. He continued by explaining it was called "the last dollar program" where all other financial aid was applied first, as well as scholarships, and whatever the balance was the state pays for. Trustee Ciambrone then asked how it was beneficial to the state.

President Rose explained the cost to educate a full-time student was about \$7,500.00 compared to the cost of educating a full-time student at William Paterson University (WPU), which was more than double. The state subsidizes a student at PCCC with \$800.00 a year, wherein at WPU the state subsidizes he/she with \$4,500.00 a year. If a student took his/her first two years at PCCC instead of WPU, the state would save money. Economists say programs like CCOG can get more students into the workforce; it would boost the economy and pay off for the

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state. President Rose stated the major reason students do not complete their college education was due do finances. The income level for that grant was \$45,000.00, and 92% of the families in Paterson are below that amount. The CCOG grant provides an opportunity to attend college. The College has already set up a separate phone line to answer the questions pertaining to that grant. Post cards have been sent out to students, and calls have been coming in asking how they could come back. President Rose then spoke about the Open Educational Resources program (OER) stating students who cannot afford the books now have the ability to have the needed textbooks online through OER. And by spring, 20% of the teaching sections would not have a book cost added to it.

Trustee Moody questioned why there was no February meeting. President Rose stated that due to some of the Trustees attending the ACCT convention in February, a meeting that month had been an issue and it has been a tradition not to hold a February meeting.

President Rose spoke about the Disposal of Surplus Property stating the College has warehouses full of "junk," obsolete computers, and broken furniture. The law requires the College must hold a public sale and the Board must authorize the sale. He stated that Vice President Hardy and Mr. Brian Egan, Associate Vice President of Facilities Management and Planning, would conduct the sale. There was a brief question and answer session about the sale items.

Trustee DuHaime asked when the outdoor sign at the Wanaque Campus was going to be repaired. President Rose informed him it was being worked on but it was not an easy fix.

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The personnel items were pending the outcome of the Executive Session discussion.

Chairman Nutter asked for a motion to go into executive session at 7:46 p.m.; moved by Trustee Marco; seconded by Trustee Tanis. Chairman Nutter stated that the Board would meet in Executive Session about twenty minutes to discuss personnel, contract matters, and matters protected by attorney-client privilege, and that no action would be taken in executive session. Upon roll call, the motion to go into executive session was approved by all members present voting "yes."
