The following are the minutes of the Board of Trustees of Passaic County Community College, One College Boulevard, Paterson, New Jersey, held on Tuesday, May 19, 2015.

CALL TO ORDER

President Rose stated that notice of the meeting was mailed to the Herald News, the Record, the Office of the County Clerk, and posted on the bulletin board of the College Boulevard building on May 4, 2015.

Chairman Nutter stated that inasmuch as adequate notice of the meeting had been given, the meeting was called to order at 7:05 p.m. A copy of the agenda was reviewed and available for public inspection.

CONSIDERATION OF MINUTES – April 21, 2015

Chairman Nutter asked for a motion on Resolution #1 – Consideration of Minutes for April 21, 2015; moved by Trustee Esquiche; seconded by Trustee Blanco. Upon roll call, Resolution #1 passed with Trustees Kebrdle and Tanis "abstaining" and all other members present voting "yes."

REPORTS

<u>President</u>: President Rose began his report by stating that this year's awards ceremonies were very successful (Nurse Education Pinning, Graduate and Academic Awards), and even more successful was the number of certified graduates to date: 1,300! He noted as well that the numbers are still rising as students complete the College Writing Exam (CWE) and other requirements for their degrees. President Rose took this opportunity to note that PCCC was one of the last colleges in the State of New Jersey that certifies its students before they are able to graduate, as well as having each pass the CWE. There was no exemption to that specific requirement, he stated.

President Rose also highlighted the fact that 43 Passaic County Technical Institute (PCTI) students would be participating in the morning ceremony, which was a milestone for them to reach, thus being awarded the Certificate of Achievement in Early Childhood Education, Child Development Associate.

Two additional items of interest President Rose presented was the 23rd Edition of the New Jersey Council of County Colleges Fact Book, which compares the statistics of the 19 community colleges in New Jersey and provides a lot of useful information. And the *Strategic Priorities for New Jersey Higher Education*, a report which was prepared by the Governor's Higher Education Council with recommendations for consideration by the governor and secretary of higher education. President Rose encouraged all to review its contents, which offers a set of priorities by the year 2025, hoping that each institution would engage some of these ideas when setting the College's institutional goals.

President Rose explained the need to revise Board Policy D401 – Graduation Requirements and recommended it as a First Reading. He stated that the changes were needed due to the New Jersey Board of Nursing guidelines relating to exit examination and a new policy on reverse transfer. A brief question and answer period took place to ensure that none of the requirements of this Board Policy were decreased due to the recommended changes.

The credits and degree earned by the PCCC students will transfer to the College of Saint Elizabeth upon graduation from PCCC.

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The articulation agreement with Saint Peter's University granting PCCC Associate of Arts in Liberal Arts-Criminal Justice Option majors the opportunity to transfer into an accelerated Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice degree program upon graduation from PCCC.

Initiation of New Program Option

The Associate in Science in Liberal Arts, Nutrition Option with thirteen (13) credits as part of the sixty-one (61) credit degree designed for students to transfer to a four year institution.

Initiation of New Certificate of Achievement

The Certificate of Achievement in Plumbing Technology, a thirteen (13) credit certificate that provides students with entry-level skill level and knowledge to prepare to enter the plumbing industry as an apprentice to a master plumber and is offered in partnership with Passaic County Technical Institute.

Discontinuance of Program Option

The purpose of this agreement is to create a systematic process to assist students who have transferred to William Paterson University to complete an associate's degree at Passaic County Community College. This agreement is an extension of any transfer agreement already in place and applies to Passaic County Community College students who have completed and transferred at least <u>30</u> college level credits from Passaic County Community College to William Paterson University but have not earned an associate's degree (an Associate of Arts, A.A., or an Associate of Science, A.S.). The signatories to this agreement commit to work collaboratively to allow academically qualified students to acquire the associate's degree. The signatures to this document authorize this agreement to become effective as of the date listed below. This agreement will be reviewed after four years and, if not renewed, will sunset after the fifth year.

Each institution agrees to the following tenets:

- 1. Appoint a contact person who will oversee this reverse transfer agreement.
- 2. Share student information in accordance with FERPA and any state and local laws including those of our regional accrediting association, the Middles States Commission on Higher Education.
- 3. Create a process to track the success of this reverse transfer agreement and share outcomes yearly.
- 4. Develop academic advisement parameters, timelines, and a plan for student correspondence that detail the steps needed to complete the reverse transfer procedure.

ARTICULATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN BERKELEY COLLEGE AND PASSAIC COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE

AGREEMENT by and between Berkeley College ("Berkeley"), an institution of higher education with a location at 44 Rifle Camp Road, Woodland Park, NJ 07424 and Passaic County Community College ("PCCC"), an institution of higher education located at One College Boulevard, Paterson, NJ 07505.

WHEREAS, the parties desire to facilitate opportunities for students who wish to transfer from PCCC with associate degrees to the baccalaureate degree programs at Berkeley; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to further that goal by defining the terms and conditions under which those students will be able to transfer to Berkeley with little or no loss of academic credits previously earned;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

I. ENROLLMENT AND TRANSFER REQUIREMENTS

Subject to the requirements below, students' associate degrees earned at PCCC will be fully transferable, as approximately 90 quarter credits (60 semester credits), towards the Berkeley baccalaureate degree requirements. Applications for transfer credit that, in the sole discretion of Berkeley, do not meet all of the requirements below will be evaluated on an individual course-by-course basis and in accordance with Berkeley's Transfer Credit Policy.

- A. Students must have graduated from PCCC with an associate's degree.
- B. Students must have completed the requisite coursework for one of the PCCC programs listed in Appendix A and must be seeking to apply those credits to a corresponding Berkeley bachelor's degree program.
 - Appendix A lists all PCCC courses and credits for the included programs and the corresponding Berkeley courses and credits toward which they will be accepted.
 - In the event that either institution modifies or eliminates any of the courses or credits in Appendix A, Berkeley, in its sole discretion, may decline to accept credits for transfer with respect to those courses unless and until the parties have mutually agreed upon an appropriate amendment of Appendix A.
- C. Only credits earned within 10 years of the date of the transfer application will be covered by this Agreement. Any credits that are more than ten (10) years old will be reviewed by the appropriate School Dean. The Dean will consider the academic requirements of the particular discipline and current industry standards when making a determination as to which credits will be accepted. If the credits are more than ten (10) years old and the Dean makes an adverse determination, then the student's degree will not be fully transferable.

VI. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTORS

It is expressly understood that Berkeley and PCCC are independent contractors. Nothing herein shall create any joint venture, legal partnership, agency relationship or otherwise provide any authority of the one party to bind the other to any third party. Neither party may act in any way as the representative of the other, nor is either party authorized to incur any liability, obligation or expense on behalf of the other party.

VII. <u>ASSIGNMENT</u>

Neither party shall assign or subcontract any portion of its rights or obligations under this Agreement to any unaffiliated person or entity without the written consent of the other party. Any attempt to do so shall be deemed null and void as between the parties. This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties' successors and permissible assigns.

VIII. NOTICE

Notice shall be given to each party at the address listed below (i) by deposit with an overnight courier with charges prepaid; (ii) by deposit in the United States mail, first-class postage prepaid by registered or certified mail; or (iii) by email to the other party, which shall be effective upon the giving of a separate acknowledgement of receipt. Any notice shall be deemed to have been given one (1) business day after deposit with an overnight courier or three (3) days after deposit in the United States mail.

IX. GOVERNING LAW; VENUE

This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of New Jersey without giving effect to any conflict of laws provisions. Any legal proceedings arising out of this Agreement shall be commenced and maintained exclusively in a state or federal court located in the State of New Jersey. The parties hereby consent to jurisdiction and waive any objections to venue in such courts.

X. ENTIRE AGREEMENT; AMENDMENT

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement and understanding between the parties relating to the subject matter it addresses and supersedes all other agreements, representations and understandings between the parties with respect thereto, including but not limited to the February 2013 agreement. Except as otherwise noted, this Agreement, including its appendices, may not be supplemented or modified without a written and dated amendment signed by both parties.

II. GENERAL INFORMATION

- A. Berkeley follows a quarter system. For in-person courses, one Berkeley credit hour is equivalent to 50 minutes of scheduled class time plus 2 hours of out-of-class work, per week, over the span of a 12 week quarter.
- B. Berkeley accepts transfer credits, not grades. Course grades received at PCCC will not be applied toward the calculation of the student's grade point average at Berkeley.
- **C.** Not all degree programs and courses are offered at every Berkeley location. Students may be required to take some courses at another location or online.
- **D.** Berkeley reserves the right to add, discontinue or modify its academic, scholarship and other programs and policies at any time.

III. <u>INSTITUTIONAL OBLIGATIONS</u>

- A. During the period of this Agreement, each party will send notice to the other prior to the implementation of any curricular changes that might affect this Agreement.
- B. The parties will use reasonable efforts to make appropriate personnel in their respective institutions aware of this Agreement and encourage them to support it. Such persons include admissions staff, counselors and appropriate faculty. Berkeley's Office of Admissions will supply PCCC with promotional literature, which will be made available to students.

IV. TERMINATION

This Agreement shall remain in effect from the date of the last signature below until it is terminated by one of the parties. Either party may terminate this Agreement by providing at least three (3) months' written notice prior to the intended date of termination.

V. PROPRIETARY MARKS; PUBLICITY

Each party acknowledges that the other is the exclusive owner of certain trademarks and service marks ("Marks"). Each party agrees not to use the Marks of the other for any purpose without prior written consent. The parties hereby grant each other permission to refer to the names of the parties and this Agreement in each party's official Catalog and web site, and in other ways for the sole purpose of promoting the successful implementation of this Agreement and communicating its contents to the general public.

XI. MISCELLANEOUS

- A. Survival of Terms. The provisions concerning intellectual property rights shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- B. Headings. Headings set forth in this Agreement are intended solely for organizational purposes and shall not affect the interpretation of the underlying provisions.
- C. Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts. Execution may be evidenced by an electronic copy (facsimile or electronic image) of the signed document.
- D. Severability. In the event a court of competent jurisdiction declares any provision of this Agreement to be void, the remaining provisions shall be deemed severed and shall remain enforceable to the full extent permitted by law.
- E. Force Majeure. Neither party shall be liable for a failure to perform its obligations under this Agreement to the extent that such performance was rendered impracticable by fire, flood, police action, public safety emergency, epidemic, natural disaster or act of terrorism or war.
- F. No Third Party Beneficiaries. Nothing in this Agreement, express or implied, is intended or shall confer upon any other person or entity, any enforceable right, benefit or remedy of any nature by reason of this Agreement.

D401 GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

All requirements of the program in which the student matriculated, as stated in the current official copy of the College Catalog at the time of matriculation, must be met. The granting of a degree from Passaic County Community College will require no less than sixty (60) college-level credits, with a minimum of thirty (30) credits completed at Passaic County Community College. Students must complete at least one-half of the credits in the major at Passaic County Community College. Students intending to graduate must notify the Registrar.

No student may be awarded any degree from Passaic County Community College until successful completion of the College Writing Exam. The examination is administered regularly and a student may attempt the examination more than once if necessary.

No student may be awarded the Associate Degree in Nurse Education until he or she has passed a comprehensive nursing examination near the end of the program

To graduate, students must successfully pass the College Writing Examination (CWE). Students with a bachelor degree or higher from a regionally accredited college or university in the United States, or former Passaic County Community College graduates returning for another degree are exempt from taking the College Writing Examination (CWE). Students with a bachelor's degree or higher, earned outside the United States, are required to take the College Writing Examination.

Former Passaic County Community College students approved for Reverse Transfer are exempt from taking the College Writing Examination (CWE), but must fulfill approved equivalent requirements at the partner college or university.
