The following are the minutes of the Board of Trustees of Passaic County Community College, One College Boulevard, Paterson, New Jersey, held in the Memorial Hall Conference Room, Room M332, on Tuesday, May 17, 2016.

CALL TO ORDER

President Rose stated that notice of the meeting was mailed to the Herald News, the Record, the Office of the County Clerk, and posted on the bulletin board of the College Boulevard building on December 1, 2015.

Chairman Nutter stated that inasmuch as adequate notice of the meeting had been given, the meeting was called to order at 7:05 p.m. A copy of the agenda was reviewed and available for public inspection.

PRESENTATIONS

Visions Student Newspaper

President Rose introduced Professor Christine Redman-Waldeyer, Assistant Professor from the English Department and Student Journalism Advisor. He noted that the student newspaper has been around for many years, and the improvement he has seen under Professor Redman-Waldyer's leadership, and the increased interests of the current students involved, was amazing.

Mr. Kevin A. Leiva, EMT, Editor-in-Chief of the Visions Student Newspaper, along with Mr. Thomas Feliciano and Mr. Marcos Salazar, provided an overview of their roles with the Literary Panther publication and the student newspaper, plus an exciting event they recently were able to cover. That event was the visit by former President Bill Clinton on May 13. Mr. Leiva

pointed out that a special-limited-version of the student newspaper was published with just that event being covered.

Through a visual display, the student staff of its newspaper showed the skills necessary, as well as, the commitment from students to create and maintain a document such as this one.

A brief discussion was held with the students and members of the Board over the current debate of having Visions Newspaper totally online or still having paper copies produced; all were applauded for their efforts.

Phi Theta Kappa

President Rose noted before the next presentation how each year, over 4,000 "nerds" across the nation attend a conference entitled "Nerd Nation." And with that announcement, Professor Jennifer Gasparino, Instructor from the Human Services Department and Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Advisor, along with Mr. Miguel De Jesus, President of PTK and his officers, literally laid out all the awards PCCC earned at that recent conference, which was held in Washington, D.C..

It was noted that 1,300 chapters of PTK exist, and for PCCC to have earned 10 awards was absolutely phenomenal. It was noted here as well that President Rose was one of those recipients being honored. A slide presentation was then shown displaying the awards being received by the students, as well as, being able to attend the trip in the first place. Each member thanked the Board and the President for its support noting those achievements could not have been done without it. All were applauded for their efforts and accomplishments.

REPORTS

President/Chairman:

President Rose took this opportunity to highlight a little more on the recent visit by former President Bill Clinton at the College for the purpose of rallying for his wife in her bid for President of the United States. He noted too that this was the first time a former President was at the College. President Rose did state that President Barack Obama was on our campus when he was Senator, when he was stomping for Mr. Jon Corzine who was running for Governor of the State of New Jersey.

The purpose to this dialogue was to show a two-minute video of President Clinton's speech and the accolades he gave to community colleges, noting how government would run better if it ran like our community college.

Chairman Nutter left the room at 7:53 p.m.

DISCUSSION AGENDA

A. Academic Items

New Academic Offering: Career Certificate in Homeland Security

Dr. Jacqueline Kineavy, Senior Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs, gave a brief overview of the 30-credit Career Certificate in Homeland Security stating that it was the first part of a "stackable credential" leading up to a degree program in that field.

Chairman Nutter returned to the meeting at 7:55 p.m.

Professor Emeritus – Eileen Maloney

President Rose recommended that the title of Professor Emeritus be granted to Professor Eileen Maloney in grateful recognition of her 42 years of dedicated service and outstanding contributions to Passaic County Community College. He introduced Professor Parsha Hobson, Associate Professor and Chair of the Radiography Department, to provide an overview of Professor Maloney's time at the College, in addition to her work both nationally and internationally.

Professor Hobson began by saying that she had the privilege of knowing Professor Maloney when she was a student in the Radiography Program, and Eileen was the one who was finally able to stabilize the program. Professor Hobson went through the many positions Professor Maloney held, such as the Chair of the Board of Licensing and Certification, and President for 26 years on the Radiography Examiners for the State of New Jersey, which was a Governor's appointed position, to name a couple.

Other accolades come from area hospitals and attending physicians, proclaiming what a great program PCCC has under the leadership of Professor Maloney. In addition to her outside obligations, Professor Maloney was also the President of the Faculty Association and the Academic Council.

Trustee Gardner asked for clarification on the meaning of the title being bestowed. President Rose stated it was a high honor for a faculty member and not given out lightly. The designation means that the faculty member will continue to be listed in perpetuity as a member of the PCCC faculty and be invited to participate in future college events such as Commencement.

At this point, President Rose took this opportunity to introduce Mr. Jose A. Fernandez, Associate Vice President for Human Resources, whom the Board approved his appointment last month.

Chairman Nutter asked for a motion on Resolution #1 – Consideration of Minutes for April 19, 2016; moved by Trustee Tanis; seconded by Trustee Akhter. Upon roll call, Resolution #1 passed with Trustee Kebrdle "abstaining" and all other members present voting "yes."

Trustee DuHaime questioned the process for selecting partners when a grant was being formulated, and who actually makes the decision on the participation of such. President Rose explained the process.

Trustee Akhter questioned the timeline in getting the gymnasium floor replacement and the bleacher replacement done in a six-week timeframe. President Rose informed Trustee Akhter that the bid outlines all the requirements that need to be met, along with specific guidelines for completion. Bid #17-02, Gymnasium Floor Replacement, was recommended to be rejected since it was over budget and only one bid was received.

2) NEED

The restaurant industry is thriving. As one of the largest private-sector employers, the industry employs 12.9 million people (10% of our nation's workforce) according to a recent National Restaurant Association (NRA) Restaurant Industry Forecast. Also the NRA expects the restaurant industry to grow to 14.4 million by 2023. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics 2012-2013 Occupational Outlook Handbook, the number of jobs for people in the food service industry is expected to increase by 9 percent by the year 2020.

The U.S. Department of Labor reports that there should be plenty of job openings for chefs, cooks and food preparation workers through 2019. Many current chefs and cooks are reaching retirement age or are leaving the workforce, causing a great need for talented employees. In addition to needing new chefs and cooks to replace retiring workers employment in the food service industry is expected to expand as more Americans spend their leisure time in restaurants rather than cooking themselves, and travel more, staying more nights in hotels. The growth of the Culinary Arts industry is closely tied to the continued growth in worldwide travel and tourism.

The New Jersey Department of Labor and Workforce Development projected through 2022 that Food Service Occupations will have a 34% increase in employment opportunities. It also projected that Passaic county will experience a 45% increase in all New Jersey employment.

While restaurants serve as a stepping stone for many—one in three Americans got their first job experience in a restaurant. It is also an industry of tremendous opportunity, where individuals of all backgrounds are given the opportunity to move up the ladder and succeed, in fact, 80% of restaurant owners began their careers as hourly workers in the industry.

In 2014 the college's Institutional Research department surveyed all new students as to a preference in several new college programs. Over 50% of students polled selected the A.A.S. Degree in Culinary Arts as their preferred major. In 2009 the college hired a market research firm to identify potential areas of new program development for the institution among businesses in Passaic County. They found that occupations in the service industry are in high demand—especially those positions in which graduates can start their own businesses with the skills earned. The creation of entrepreneurs is a goal for the future development of Passaic County and the college. One of the new programs to be considered according to the survey was an AAS degrees and certificate programs in Culinary Arts.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

CU 102 Introduction to Culinary Arts (2 Credits)

Semester Offered: Fall & Spring

This course introduces the student on how to achieve his or her goal in the Culinary Arts Program. A brief history of key figures and developments in culinary arts is also covered. Students will learn studying techniques, ethics, professionalism and image making. CU 104 Culinary Fundamentals (3 Credits)

Semester Offered: Fall & Spring

This course covers the essentials for entering the food industry as a working professional chef. The course serves as introduction to cooking terminology, techniques and theories, proper knife handling, measurement, cooking methods, food handling standards, seasoning and tasting, and production organization and timing skills. Open to all non-majoring students with permission from Culinary Program Director. Uniform and tools required.

Lecture Hours: 1 Lab Hours: 4

CU 106 Garde Manger (3 Credits) Semester Offered: Fall & Spring

This course expands on the techniques introduced in CU 104 Culinary Fundamentals, and it prepares the student for an introductory level position in the food service industry in Prep/Garde Manger. Intermediate knife skills, food fabrication, kitchen sanitation, and classic techniques in making Soups, Salads, Charcuterie items, Sandwiches, Hors d'oeuvres, and Breakfast Cookery are accomplished. Recipe comprehension, organization, cooking methods and techniques will be stressed.

Lecture Hours: 1 Lab Hours: 4

CU 108 Culinary Cooking Methods (3 Credits)

Semester Offered: Fall & Spring

This course expands on the fundamentals introduced in CU 104 Culinary Fundamentals and prepares the student for an introductory level position in the food service industry in Prep/Line cook. Intermediate knife skills, food fabrication, kitchen sanitation, and classic, essential cooking methods such as sautéing, grilling, stewing, braising, frying and poaching are accomplished. Modern cooking techniques such as sous vide, will be introduced. Recipe comprehension, organization, cooking methods and technique will be stressed.

Lecture Hours: 1 Lab Hours: 4

CU 114 Baking Fundamentals (3 Credits)

Semester Offered: Fall & Spring

This course covers the essentials for entering the food industry as a working professional baker. The course serves as an introduction to baking terminology, techniques and theories, proper knife handling, measurement, cooking and baking methods, food handling standards, seasoning and tasting, and production organization and timing skills. Open to all non-majoring students with permission from the Culinary Program Director. Uniform and tools required.

Lecture Hours: 1 Lab Hours: 4

CU 121 Sanitation and Safety in Food and Beverage Service (2 credits)

Semester Offered: Fall & Spring

In this course the students develop an understanding of sanitation and safety concepts in the operation of a food and beverage service establishment. Focus is on current laws, food-borne illnesses, safe storage of food, food protection in receiving, preparation and serving, pest control, accident prevention and crisis management. Course also includes learning about alcohol law, the prevention of intoxication and handling issues that may arise in an establishment serving alcohol.

Prerequisites: College Level Placement Lecture Hours: 1 Lab Hours: 2

CU 122 Food & Beverage Cost Control (3 credits)

Semester Offered: Fall & Spring

A one semester lecture designed for Culinary Arts majors for the study of the principles of food and beverage cost control. This course covers issues concerning the efficient cost management of a food and beverage operation, emphasizing the understanding of sales management and expense tracking and controls.

Prerequisites: BU 101 and BU 102

Lecture Hours: 3 Lab Hours: 0

CU 202 Culinary Externship (4 Credits)

Semester Offered: Fall & Spring

Designed to provide the student with an opportunity to practice culinary skills and knowledge learned in the classroom. Under the supervision of experienced chefs, students will assist with preparation, cooking and service of food. Development of paper and photographic portfolio are required for this course. 135-hour practicum plus weekly 50-minute seminar (supervision).

EN 101 Composition I (3 credits)

Focuses on the stages of the writing process and includes a formal MLA research paper. A variety of writing and reading assignments are designed to develop analytical and critical thinking skills.

3 hours lecture

Prerequisites: EN 004 or ENW 107 and ENR 107 with a minimum grade of "C" or test placement

SC 103 Nutrition (4 credits)

This course introduces students to the biochemical basis of nutrient action. Topics include the structure, function and metabolism of the three primary nutrients—carbohydrates,

lipids and proteins, as well as the interaction of various enzymes, vitamins and hormones on food metabolism. Physiology of nutrient deficiencies and study in methods

of research in nutrition will also be included. Laboratory experiments include chemical analysis of major nutrients, measurement of kilocalories, metric units and percentages of nutrients.

3 hours lecture: 3 hours laboratory

College Level Placement in EN, RD and MA

CIS 101 Computer Concepts and Applications (3 credits)

Introduces a variety of topics in computers and computing including history and evolution of computers, data representation, hardware systems and application programs, Windows and application software. Class time and open lab are used to complete Microsoft Office software projects. For non-majors only.

3 hours lecture; open laboratory

Cannot be used to fulfill CIS elective credit in IT major or Business major (IT option).

TRANSFER ARTICULATION AGREEMENT

BETWEEN THE

WILLIAM PATERSON UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCES Bachelor of Arts in Sociology

AND

PASSAIC COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE Associate in Arts in Liberal Arts - Sociology Option

The intent of this articulation agreement is to define the procedures for a transfer articulation between William Paterson University College of Humanities and Social Sciences and Passaic County Community College. Both entities agree to mutual cooperation in establishing and maintaining articulation for their respective programs for the Associate in Arts in Liberal Arts-Sociology Option transferable to Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology at the William Paterson University College of Humanities and Social Sciences. The principal beneficiaries of this agreement are students enrolled in the Associate in Arts in Liberal Arts-Sociology Option program at Passaic County Community College. Their progress toward their degrees is best assured when they are provided with current information about courses and programs and protected by firm arrangements between departments and institutions, thereby allowing them to plan a total baccalaureate degree through program to program agreement at the outset of their college education.

Students seeking to major in Sociology at Passaic County Community College will be subject to all the requirements of native candidates at William Paterson University. Students who complete their Associate in Arts in Liberal Arts-Sociology Option degree and meet the grade point average set forth by William Paterson University College of Humanities and Social Sciences will be guaranteed admission into the Sociology major with third year (junior) status. These students will be exempt from taking WPU University Core Curriculum course requirements. Students are required to take the foreign language requirement and any class required for the major at William Paterson University conditional upon meeting the prerequisites of the minimum requirements for admission to the College of Humanities and Social Sciences.

William Paterson University agrees to accept all the general education or university core credits included in this agreement. Per its transfer credit policy, William Paterson University agrees to accept up to half of the credits required for the major. Course equivalencies for Sociology prerequisites and major courses will also be accepted (see Appendix A for specific course requirements) and will serve as the basis for equivalencies.

This agreement will become effective immediately upon the signatures of both parties. Immediately thereafter, William Paterson University will provide information packets for transfer admission, special transfer days, and other recruitment services. In turn, Passaic County Community College will make available to its students all information, including the list of course equivalencies pertaining to this agreement. The agreement and equivalencies will be reviewed on a regular basis.

PRINCIPLES OF THE AGREEMENT

COMPLETION OF PROGRAMS

Passaic County Community College transfer students will be required to meet all graduation requirements as listed for William Paterson University students.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

The determination of major program requirements for a baccalaureate degree in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences shall be the responsibility of William Paterson University.

ELIGIBILITY

A. Course equivalencies and/or area requirements. Specific courses required for admission to the Sociology programs have been included in Appendix A.

B. Students with an Associate in Arts in Liberal Arts-Sociology Option Degree

Students who earn an Associate in Arts in Liberal Arts-Sociology Option degree at Passaic County Community College are exempt from taking University Core Curriculum course requirements. However, they are required to take the foreign language requirement and any class required for the major at William Paterson University conditional upon meeting the prerequisites of the minimum requirements for admission to the College of Humanities and Social Sciences. Associate in Arts in Liberal Arts-Sociology Option degree students will be provided with individual evaluations of coursework based on course equivalencies articulated between Passaic County Community College and William Paterson University College of Humanities and Social Sciences.

FINANCIAL AID

College students transferring to William Paterson University will be treated the same as native William Paterson University students of equal class standing when applying for financial aid and in the award and distribution of funds.

AGREEMENT REVIEW AND UPDATE

William Paterson University and Passaic County Community College will assign a staff member to serve as a liaison to assure maintenance of communication between the two institutions. As necessary, Passaic County Community College and William Paterson University faculty shall meet to discuss academic programs, especially with regard to any changes being contemplated. William Paterson University and Passaic County Community College representatives will consult whenever changes in policy or curricula are articulated which will affect students transferring under the terms of this Agreement. Representatives from both institutions shall also facilitate support, consultation, and collaboration between their faculties in matters related to this Agreement, general education, degree requirements, education certification, and other academic matters.
